What are the facts Nationally?

93% of all 5-15 year olds used the internet in 2013

The estimated weekly volume of internet use at home in 2013 was 17 hours for 12-15 year olds

11% of 9-16 year olds have encountered sexual images on the internet in the past 12 months

12-15 year olds have an average of 272 social networking friends

29% of UK children aged 9-16 years old said they had contact online with someone they have not met face to face

47% of parents of a child aged 5-15 felt their child knew more about the internet than they did



Leicestershire 2014 survey 14-15 years

70% said parents did not monitor their internet use

11% have met up with someone-third of these took no one

90% have a social network profile

90% go online with a mobile device

41% use a webcam – 6% meet new people 58% have over 200 online friends

20% have sent an indecent picture of themselves

27% have received threats or harrassment

7% had sent a self taken naked picture

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Leicestershire 2014 survey year 6 students

50% go online with a mobile device

20% play online games for over 3 hours a day

10% have over 200 online friends

25% don't know which privacy setting they use

40% said parents did not supervise them

20% said they saw something online that upset them

37% use a webcam

48% have a social network profile


20% have received threats or harassment

Control Privacy When You Post


You can manage the privacy of your status updates, photos and profile info using the inline audience selector — when you share or afterwards. Remember: the people you share with can always share your information with others, including apps. Try editing your profile to see how it works or learn more.



Control Your Default Privacy

This setting will apply to status updates and photos you post to your profile from a Facebook app that doesn't have the inline audience selector, like the Facebook App for iPhone.


Control what happens when friends tag you or your content.

When someone uses the internet or mobile technology to deliberately upset someone.








Sexting

PEGI

PEGI (The Pan-European Game Information age rating system) was established in 2003 to help European parents make informed choices



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Violence - Game contains depictions of violence

Discrimination - Game contains depictions of, or material which may encourage, discrimination

Sex - Game depicts nudity and/or sexual behaviour or sexual references

Drugs - Game refers to or depicts the use of drugs

Fear - Game may be frightening or scary for young children

Bad Language - Game contains bad language


Welcome to CEOP's Thinkuknow
