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
Non-Chronological Reports

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**Use organisational devices to structure your text
e.g. sub-headings**

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Use a formal tone

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Use technical or topic language

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End with a summary

Top tip:

To make your information booklet stand out, you might want to use pictures and bold titles.

Here are some examples of what you could create:

Machu Picchu



Perched high above the Urubamba River in Peru, this remarkable site was once believed to be a country retreat for the elites in Inca society.


Be sure to take your cameras to capture the organic blend of architecture and the site's natural setting of tropical cloud forests and Andes mountains.

The number of visitors to the site has been limited to 2,500 people per day, so buy your entrance tickets in advance to avoid disappointment.

The Colosseum

This enormous amphitheatre of stone and concrete was once home to ancient Rome's most violent public spectacles. Contests between gladiators took part here, as did public executions and shows in which trained hunters stalked and killed wild beasts.

Today, visitors can tour the interior areas, underground passageways and visit the museum dedicated to life as part of their tour of the historic city of Rome, Italy.




Chichen Itza

During its golden years, Chichen Itza in Mexico was a site of political and religious importance for the Mayan civilisation.

Visit the various temples on the site such as the Pyramid of Kukulcan which has 365 steps – evidence that the Mayans understood the solar year – and observe the serpents which decorate them.

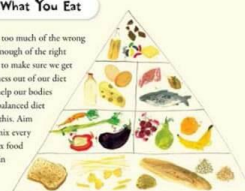
Whilst there, you can imagine yourself playing in the largest known example of a ritual ball court where players had to hit a heavy rubber ball through stone hoops set high up on the walls as they played pok-tok.

Fresh ingredients

Eggs
Onions
Garlic
Chillies
Root ginger
Herbs (coriander, parsley, mint)



Sweet ingredients

Sugar
Honey
Vanilla extract (a natural, liquid version of vanilla)



Spice rack

Cinnamon sticks and ground cinnamon
Vanilla pods
Black pepper, whole and ground
Chilli powder
Ground coriander
Ground cumin
Turmeric powder
Ground ginger
Paprika



Using spices

Drop whole spices into dishes while they cook and then take them out before serving. Or you can turn whole spices into powder by grinding them in a coffee or spice grinder.
